"When We Cry Out" (Teaching Sketch)

Judges 6:7-10 (NIV)

God's ways are not our ways, we are told in the scriptures. [a] This is what the Israelites found when they cried out to God because of the oppression of the Midianites (brawling contentious ones).

Man's Expectations

Man's expectations are, more often than naught, that God will become involved in the way man would or wants. When man expects God to do it man's way there is a definite lack of humility and understanding apparent on man's part.

Lost Focus

Israel spent seven long years not enjoying the hand of God because they had lost their focus on God and his desire to relate to his chosen people. God wants to have an intimate relation with his people. It is this desire of God which needs to motivate mankind reaching out to God. This was not the case as related in our scripture. God's people cried out for help because of pain rather than passion for God.

A Prophet

A prophet was God's response to his people. A prophet with a message from God for those crying out. Can you just imagine the disappointment when an army of angels or a few well placed plagues did not appear to avenge and protect "God's People" the way they thought God should have, would have, could have!

The Lord Speaks

God, through his prophet, spoke to the Israelites, rather than meeting their expectations of what needed to be done. God's prophet gave the Israelites a history lesson.

- 1. The first part of the lesson was their deliverance from the bondage of Egypt. Egypt is often used to represent bondage in scripture. This can be seen as the condition of the individual before they accept Christ. Slavery to sin. Ignorance of the blessings of God and his Kingdom.

Scripture:

Judges 6:7-10 (NIV)

7 When the Israelites cried to the LORD because of Midian, 8 he sent them a prophet, who said, "This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: I brought you up out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery. 9 I snatched you from the power of Egypt and from the hand of all your oppressors. I drove them from before you and gave you their land. 10 I said to you, 'I am the LORD your God; do not worship the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you live.' But you have not listened to me."

> 7Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the LORD, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon. 8For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the LORD. 9For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts. (Isaiah 55:7-9 KJV)

history lesson given by God's prophet is their deliverance from, "the hand of their oppressors the occupants of the "Promise Land" by driving the oppressors out before them and giving the promise land to them. God kept his word. God does not lie!

3. Ending the history lesson through the prophet, God reminds them, "I am the LORD your God; do not worship the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you live.' But you have not listened to me."

Living In The Promise

God reminded the Israelites of all he had done for them as a people, his people. It was then he told them the admonition he had given them regarding being true to worshiping him and not other gods. They lived in a land where the demonic powers had been deposed thus delivering the Israelites from their oppression. The Israelites did evil by not living in the promise. We, believers. must live in the "Promise Land," the Kingdom of God, where there is salvation, healing, and deliverance!
