What is Love?

Sometimes we find it necessary to look into the meanings of words to make certain we understand what is being said both to us and by us. The understood or generally used meaning may change over a period of time.

Love has come to have so many different meanings in English that it is difficult to know what the meaning is without knowing the person saying it, the thing about which it is being said, and the context in which it is used. Boy! Love as a word can get as complicated as the expressing of it.

Paul Speaks of Love

The word charity (KJV) or love (NIV) is one of those words. In the original Greek, used by the Apostle Paul, it means:

He even goes so far to say if he gave all to the poor, went through torture, he would gain nothing without love.

God Is Love

Looking at 1 John 4:8 is where we find the statement "He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is Love." The word for *love* here is the same word used by Paul to the Corinthians.

Attributes Of Love

- 1. Patience—long-spirited, forbearing, enduring
- 2. Kind—show oneself useful, act benevolently, to be kind
- 3. Not envious—does not covet or envy
- 4. Not boast-not a braggart, self promoter
- 5. Not proud—inflating oneself, haughty. This is different from being confident.
- 6. Not rude—unbecoming, not thoughtless toward others
- 7. Not self-seeking—does not plot for its own good to the detriment of others
- 8. Not easily angered—not easily provoked or exasperated.

- 10. Does not delight in evil—injustice, wrongfulness (of character, or behavior), unjust

- 13. Always trusts—always *expects* is *confident*
- 14. Always perseveres remains, has fortitude, endures, tarry behind
- 15. Never fails—drops away, not driven out of course, becomes insufficient, has no effect
